INTRODUCTION

Please use this document as a guide as you submit requests for earmark funding.

March 26th, 2021

This email should only be used for attachments and other documents that are unable to be submitted via the Google Forms. Only requests submitted via the Google Form will be considered.

BASICS

There are 4 types of submissions:

1. **Programmatic** - General support or funding for a program
 - *Example: Provide \$150,000,000 for Small Business Development Centers.*
2. **Report Language** - Request to add language to report accompanying the bill. This does not include dollar amounts
 - *Example: The Committee encourages SBA and its resource partners to continue efforts to increase outreach and direct support to women entrepreneurs and small businesses in underserved communities.*
3. **Bill Language** – Request to add or change statutory language of an Appropriations bill.
 - *Example: Sec. 522. None of the funds made available in this Act may be used to purchase first class or premium airline travel in contravention of sections 301–10.122 through 301–10.124 of title 41 of the Code of Federal Regulations.*

4. **Community project funding** - Directs funds to a specific state or local government or eligible non-profit recipient. A Member of Congress may only submit ten community project funding requests to the Appropriations Committee each year.
- *Example: Provide \$500,000 for an entrepreneur training program in Warren, OH.*

COMMUNITY PROJECT FUNDING INSTRUCTIONS

Please find your corresponding subcommittee that your request belongs to and identify the accounts within the subcommittee that are eligible for community project funding requests. For any community project request, community engagement and demonstrated public support are crucial in determining which projects are worthy of Federal funding. Examples of such support include:

1. Letters of support from elected community leaders (e.g. mayors or other officials),
2. Press articles highlighting the need for the requested Community Project Funding,
3. Support from newspaper editorial boards,
4. Projects listed on State intended use plans, community development plans, or other publicly available planning documents, or
5. Resolutions passed by city councils or boards.

In general, for all requests, the minimum information needed to evaluate a request is below:

1. Proposed recipient and address of recipient
2. Amount in the request
3. An explanation of the request:
4. Project site location
5. Purpose
6. Why it is valuable to taxpayer funds
